

Steps:

- Perform a basic needs assessment
- •Fulfill unmet needs relevant to child health

Actions Taken To Date

- Offered health education through casual community dinners in which pediatric residents and volunteers served community members a healthy, low cost meal (along with its recipe) and discussed relevant health topics
- Health topics so far have included: fevers and viral illnesses, literacy (partnership with Tandem), ER vs. Urgent Care vs. PCP, spring break safety, developmental

milestones, asthma management, and when to see your doctor

Hosted two successful dinners on August 29th and October 24th

Next Steps

- Apply for resident grant
- Encourage more intern and medical student volunteer involvement
- Focus on meal planning and grocery shopping using foods from local grocery stores













Adolescent Workshops

Project Goals: To meet with adolescents to provide education and resources around health topics of their choice. Will focus primarily on adolescents in Huckleberry's college prep program, but also target teens through the school district, and at Juvenile Hall.

Actions To Date:

- Senior residents received Mt. Zion Health Fund grant to further develop Huckleberry partnership
- Started teaching science classes at juvenile hallsuccessful class on 12/18; two upcoming classes on 3/5 and 3/19
- Three upcoming classes at Huckleberry on 1/9, 1/23, and 2/6 and will cover managing stress, drugs and the teen body, and basic nutrition.



Next Steps:

- Standardize teaching for Juvenile Hall classes and for Huckleberry classes for reproducibility and longevity
- Incorporate pre and post-workshop questionnaires for quality improvement
- Provide goodie bags for each class
- Follow up with Eve Eckman to organize a "Naming Emotions" workshop
- Combine science classes with those at juvenile hall or table at the juvenile hall health fair

Project Goals: A collaboration between OB/GYN residents and pediatric residents in an effort to better support expectant parents and parents of newborns in a group setting

Actions to date:

- Had initial newborn session in March 2018 at centering group and played jeopardy
 - with the moms!
- Have 2 sessions coming up this winter on 1/4 and 3/8
- Claire Gibson will present at the Academic Pediatric Association Regional
 Conference on January 26th

Next Steps:

- Teach newborn sessions at upcoming centering groups (3 planned for the 2019 academic year)
- Continue to work on partnership with the OB/GYN department
- Attempt group visits for primary care well child visits after families deliver
- Indentify what to track/measure for project development and improvement e.g.:
 - Assessment of parental knowledge about newborn care and how to access pediatric resources
